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

40 Years of Prevention Science Research Advances



- Predictors: Discovery of risk and protective factors that predict behavioral & mental health problems
- 2. Programs: Over 80 prevention programs and policies have been tested and shown to work!
- 3. Communities are an effective organizing force







Despite the Evidence, Tested and Effective Prevention Programs and Policies Are Not Widely Used

In fact...


Prevention approaches that do not work or have not been evaluated are more widely used than those shown to be effective.





Communities That Care = Powerful Results





- 33% tobacco
- 32% alcohol
- 25% delinquent behavior


A large trial of Communities That Care produced reductions in drug use and delinquency.





Communities That Care = Powerful Results





- 49% Less likely to initiate gateway drug use (tobacco, marijuana, and alcohol).
- 18% Less likely to initiate antisocial behavior
- 11% Lower lifetime incidence of violence
- For males:
 - 30% more likely to abstain from tobacco use
 - 24% more likely to abstain from marijuana use
 - 18% reduced lifetime incidence of inhalant use

Sustained effects through age 21!

Cost Benefit Summary



Communities That Care is Cost-Beneficial – even when effect sizes are reduced by 50%

- For every \$1 spent \$5.13 return on investment
- Low risk of negative investment return likely to get a benefit 99 times out of 100

What is CTC?



- Guided by the Social Development Strategy to promote healthy youth behaviors
- Community owned and operated: run by a coalition of community stakeholders from all sectors
- Data Driven: the community makes its decisions using the community's own data
- Evidence Based: adoption of effective programs
- Outcome Focused: reductions in community levels of adolescent risk taking behavior; improvements in child & youth well-being

Nationwide CTC Map










Global CTC Map
