Why alcohol?

- Excessive alcohol use costs the state of Alaska \$2.4B annually.¹
- Alcohol-attributable deaths in Alaska surpass meth and opioid-attributable deaths combined.²
- While underage alcohol use has declined over time, 46% of Alaskan adults still think it's safe for individuals under 21 to consume alcohol.³

Decision-making for System Change Networks



Decisions imply power.

As a consent-based protocol, it reinforces a **commitment to engagement and trust** among participants who are impacted by decisions, to both listen to each other and adapt, and to make timely decisions.

It is an imperfect process, arriving at decisions that are **good enough to try** and **safe enough to fail.**




Consent-based decision-making
